#### WATERS OF THE U.S.

- Clean Water Act requires permits for discharges to "waters of the U.S." (WOTUS)
- WOTUS definition subject to regulatory uncertainty in the 15 years since Rapanos
   Supreme Court decision
  - 2008 Rapanos Guidance
  - 2011 Draft WOTUS Guidance (withdrawn before finalized)
  - 2015 Clean Water Rule
  - 2020 Navigable Waters Protection Rule

#### **ENDLESS CYCLE OF WOTUS REGULATION?**

Agencies Promulgate New WOTUS Definition

Revert to 1980s
Regulations and
Rapanos Guidance


New WOTUS

/ Set Aside by Courts

## **2020 NAVIGABLE WATERS PROTECTION RULE**

- In effect June 2020 August 2021
- Key components:
  - Four categories of jurisdictional waters
    - 1. Territorial seas and traditional navigable waters (TNWs)
    - 2. Tributaries
    - 3. Lakes and ponds, and impoundments of jurisdictional waters
    - 4. Adjacent wetlands
  - 12 categories of exclusions
    - E.g., ephemeral features, ditches not considered "tributaries"
  - Key clarifications for existing concepts
    - E.g., "adjacent wetland"

#### REMAND AND VACATUR OF NWPR

- DOJ sought <u>remand without vacatur</u> in pending cases
  - Some plaintiffs argued NWPR should be vacated while agencies reconsidered rulemaking
- On August 30, Arizona district court remanded and <u>vacated</u> NWPR
  - Pasqua Yaqui Tribe v. EPA (D. Ariz.)
  - Likely appeal to Ninth Circuit (and potential for motion to stay pending appeal)
- 4 courts have granted DOJ request for remand
  - N.D. Cal., D. Mass, N.D.N.Y., D.S.C.

#### **CURRENT WOTUS IMPLEMENTATION**

"The agencies have halted implementation of the Navigable Waters Protection Rule and are interpreting 'waters of the United States' consistent with the pre2015 regulatory regime until further notice. The agencies continue to review the [Arizona district court] order and consider next steps. This includes working expeditiously to move forward with the rulemakings announced on June 9, 2021 . . ."

#### **PENDING JDs AND PERMITS**

- Approved jurisdictional determinations (AJDs) generally valid for 5 years unless:
  - New information warrants revision prior to expiration
  - Corps identifies geographic areas with rapidly changing conditions meriting evaluation on more frequent basis
- Corps will stand by AJDs and permits previously issued under NWPR:
  - AJDs completed under NWPR prior to August 30 remain valid until expiration date unless criteria for revision met or AJD recipient requests new AJD
  - AJDs that were pending on, or received after August 30, will be completed consistent with *Rapanos* Guidance

#### **UPCOMING WOTUS RULEMAKINGS**

- Agencies have announced two WOTUS rulemakings:
  - Step 1 Rulemaking: Reinstate 1980s regulations "updated to be consistent with relevant Supreme Court decisions"
  - Step 2 Rulemaking: New WOTUS definition that "builds upon that regulatory foundation"
- Biden Admin. rulemaking efforts so far:
  - In August 2021, Agencies held public meetings and took pre-proposal recommendations from stakeholders
  - No timing provided for Step 1 proposal, but Arizona decision may result in quicker Step 1 process

#### **ISSUES TO WATCH IN WOTUS RULEMAKINGS**

Reliance on *Rapanos* – i.e., use of significant nexus

**Bright lines v. case-by-case jurisdiction** 

**Traditional navigable waters** 

**Ephemeral/intermittent streams** 

**Ditches** 

Isolated wetlands/waters

Exclusions – e.g., waste treatment, prior converted cropland
